SUMMARY ORDER OF REVOCATION

Pursuant to K.S.A. 77-537

The above-captioned matter comes on for action by the Kansas Commission on Peace Officers' Standards and Training (Commission) through a summary proceeding under the Kansas Administrative Procedures Act, K.S.A. 77-537, regarding the law enforcement certification of JORDAN SCHULTZ (Respondent).

STATEMENT OF FACTS

1. The Commission granted Respondent a full-time law enforcement certification, certification number 32331.
2. Respondent was employed as a full-time law enforcement officer with the Johnson County Park Police (JCPP) from November 16, 2020, to June 30, 2021.
3. On June 21, 2021, Respondent's supervisors met with him to implement a Performance Improvement Plan. The supervisors asked to review Respondent's Police Training Program Journal (Journal) and Respondent

stated that he had left it at home. Respondent was required to keep his Journal with him during his work shift. When asked if his Journal entries were current, Respondent confirmed that they were. Respondent was told that if his Journal was not current, he needed to be honest. Respondent again claimed that the Journal was current. At the conclusion of the meeting, Respondent was directed to go home to retrieve the Journal. Shortly thereafter, Respondent returned to inform his supervisors that he had not been truthful. Respondent had not completed the required entries in the Journal since May 31, 2021.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Unprofessional Conduct – Dishonesty in Official Communication

4. Pursuant to K.S.A. 74-5616(b)(7), the Commission may revoke the certification of any police or law enforcement officer who has engaged in unprofessional conduct as defined by rules and regulations of the Commission.
5. K.A.R. 106-2-3(j)(1) defines unprofessional conduct as, except for a legitimate law enforcement purpose, intentionally using a false or deceptive statement in any official document or official communication.
6. Respondent was intentionally dishonest in an official JCPP process. Respondent was dishonest to conceal that he had not been completing his Journal as required. Respondent's dishonesty was not related to a legitimate law enforcement purpose. When given the opportunity to be honest, Respondent continued to lie.

Good Moral Character

7. Pursuant to K.S.A. 74-5616(b)(1) the Commission may revoke the certification of a police or law enforcement officer who fails to meet and maintain the requirements of K.S.A. 74-5605 or 74-5607a, and amendments thereto.

8. K.S.A. 74-5605(b)(5) states that each applicant for certification shall be of good moral character to warrant the public trust in the applicant as a police officer or law enforcement officer.
9. K.A.R. 106-2-4(a) defines good moral character as including the personal traits or qualities of integrity, honesty, upholding the laws of the state and nation, conduct that warrants the public trust, and upholding the oath required for certification as specified in K.A.R. 106-3-6.
10. Pursuant to K.A.R. 106-2-4(b), any single incident or event may suffice to show that a law enforcement officer has failed to maintain good moral character.
11. Respondent's conduct shows that he lacks the personal qualities of integrity, honesty, conduct that warrants the public trust, and upholding the oath required for certification.

Summary Proceedings

12. Under K.S.A. 77-537, the Commission may conduct these summary proceedings, subject to Respondent's request for a hearing. The Commission finds that the use of summary proceedings in these circumstances does not violate any provisions of law and the protection of the public interest does not require the Commission to give notice and opportunity to participate to any person other than Respondent.

ORDER

Based on the Statement of Facts and Conclusions of Law, the Commission orders that the Kansas Law Enforcement Officer Certification of JORDAN SCHULTZ be revoked.

ACCORDINGLY, THE KANSAS COMMISSION ON PEACE OFFICERS' STANDARDS AND TRAINING CERTIFICATE OF JORDAN SCHULTZ IS HEREBY REVOKED.

FURTHER, Respondent is ordered to surrender and return to the Commission all evidence of his certification as a law enforcement officer.

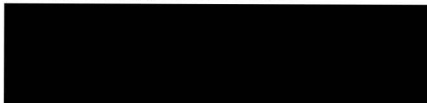
NOTICE OF RELIEF FROM THIS SUMMARY ORDER




